Local long-term care chains approve of new ministry website

Both Caressant Care and peopleCare are giving an early thumbs-up as the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care has created a new website for those considering placing a loved one into a long-term care home.

As part of its plan to fix long-term care, the Ontario government has launched the 'Long-Term Care Homefinder,' a site and search tool to provide prospective residents and their families with a one-stop-shop to find and compare long-term care homes across the province, along with other resources to help people make an informed choice when considering long-term care.

Caressant Care owns and operates 15 longterm care homes in Ontario, including the Maples Home for Seniors, and the company's Marketing Manager, Stuart Oakley, says so far, so good. "It appears to be a useful tool to help people navigate the often-complicated process of finding a home for a loved one. We are certainly supportive of the website."

Sheena Campbell is the Vice President of Communications and Engagement at people-Care, who owns and operates eight long-term care homes, including one in Tavistock, and she says they are on board with the new site. "peopleCare appreciates the government's ongoing efforts to strengthen transparency and accountability across the LTC sector in a variety of ways, such as the new LTC Homefinder site. When seniors and their families are looking at their LTC options, what they are really doing is choosing their new home."

Each long-term care home in the province has a profile page with information about waitlists,

reports, contact information and more. The new site also provides information that can help people decide if long-term care is the best option for them and, if so, how to choose a home, apply, and move in.

Oakley says all that data is out there, but the new site allows for easy access to critical data. "This information has always been publicly available. Now it is available in one location, so it is a fair approach to navigating LTC and the options available.

Campbell echoes the Caressant Care response, saying the convenience will help the decision-making process. "From a quality-of-life perspective, the more information they have at their fingertips to help them learn about what the experience of living in that home is like, the better. And as a one-stop-shop, if the LTC Homefinder site makes it easier for seniors to navigate the system and make informed decisions, that's also a good thing.

Future phases of the website and search tool will include more information on each home's profile pages as well as other new features based on public feedback. When all the information is in place, the long-term care Homefinder site will be a resource for Ontarians looking for information about the province's long-term care system.

Oakley says his only concern is a member of the public posing inappropriate information. "The only concern really would be if people were to post private information about a resident or a staff member." He adds that publicly posting reviews is nothing new to the sector. "We have Google reviews, social media comments on posts and tweets. If information is not inflammatory or breaches confidentiality

we would have nothing to fear if a review was not favourable. We view every negative or critical comment as an opportunity for us to do better. We would have to see how this would be managed going forward to be able to respond more specifically on the type of feedback the government would consider allowing. It is ear-

While Campbell didn't address the question of concerns when it comes to public feedback, she did say peopleCare is excited about the government's plans to move ahead with a sector-wide long-term care resident and family experience survey. "We regularly survey our residents and families already to learn more about the areas in which they think we're doing a great job and opportunities to improve when we don't meet expectations. Standardized experience surveys will help all long-term care operators understand what's really important to residents and their families and what meaningful actions they can take to improve." Historically, homes came up with their own surveys. This is the first time each home will use the same survey to collect data.

"Our government has a plan to fix long-term care, and a key part of that plan is strengthening accountability, enforcement, and transparency in the long-term care system," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Long-Term Care. "Our new Homefinder website brings together all the information families need to make informed decisions about long-term care so they can choose a home that will best meet the needs of their loved ones."

Slowly but surely, I'm reading through the past pages of the Tavistock Gazette (est. 1895). Within this weekly column I'd like to share with you some of my findings.

February 8, 2012 Edition (10 years ago)

Members of the Perth County OPP responded to a collision in the hamlet of Hampton at 4:51 p.m. on Monday, February 6 that left 11 people dead. Investigation has revealed that a 15-seater passenger van with 13 persons inside was westbound on Line 47 when it was struck in the intersection by a straight truck travelling southbound on Perth Road 107. Ten occupants inside the van were pronounced dead at the scene along with the driver of the

The flour mill and knitting mill are still running full staff and full time. Messrs. Zimmerman Bros. box factory has been running steadily with the exception of a few days devoted to repairs but we understand a partial number of their employees were laid off last week owing to scarcity of orders.

The first annual meeting of the Tavistock Cheese and Butter Co., Limited, was held on Wednesday afternoon, February 8th, in Library Hall, when a large number of shareholders and patrons were present. A. H. Goring, president of the company, presided over the meeting.
